Grace and peace to you all!

Recently I shared in worship my ongoing commitment to and attempts at memorizing Colossians 3:1-17. This short manifesto by Paul calls the church to a distinctive way of being in this world. There are clearly behaviors Christians should be clinging to, while others must be removed from our lives. Making such clear and bounded choices for how we are going to be distinguishes Christ's Body, the Church, from the rest of the world. I cling to these words by Dallas Willard in his book *The Divine Conspiracy*...

"the most telling thing about the contemporary Christian is that he or she simply has no compelling sense that understanding of and conformity with the clear teachings of Christ is of any vital importance to his or her life, and certainly not that it is in any way essential... the practical irrelevance of actual obedience to Christ accounts for the weakened effect of Christianity in the world today, with its increasing tendency to emphasize political and social action as the primary way to serve God. It also accounts for the practical irrelevance of Christian faith to individual character development and overall personal sanity and well-being." (pg. xv)

If we believe these words are true, then in this long quote Willard invites us to consider the challenges of being the Church today. The Church has co-existed with our culture long enough to lose its potency and purpose by becoming a mere reflection of the world around us. Our potency and mission as Baldwin Community UMC is *actual obedience to Christ* in every facet of our lives. As disciples of Christ, you and I are called to consider every part of our lives as a means for obedience --- our work, our relationships, our choices, our church --- so that we begin to look less like our culture and more like the hope we cling to in Christ. We can no longer afford the church growth conversations that appear to fix the church as we focus on the externals of lighting, facilities, music, and appearances. The renewed, revitalized church must return to what we've known all along.... actual obedience to Christ. "And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Colossians 3:17a). The world waits for us to remember that we must be Christians living in a way that matters, restoring hope, healing brokenness, and transforming the world.

I am so thankful that God has called me to Baldwin Community UMC, and I look forward to the many ways you and I will discover to live and grow in this conversation on actual obedience to Christ. Join with me in praying without ceasing for every event and worship service shared in this newsletter! Let us pray for greater devotion and obedience, embracing the multitudes of blessings that are already ours in Christ alone!

Children, Youth, and Adult Discipleship

Baldwin Community family,

If you've seen me upfront during services over the past couple of months, you might be thinking, "Hey, who is this guy?" So I wanted to take the opportunity of this newsletter to introduce myself. My name is Justin Pearl. I am a theologian and religious educator who recently graduated from Duquesne University's Ph.D. program in theology. I am deeply passionate about religious education, particularly Biblical literacy. Indeed, I see one of my main roles at Baldwin to be introducing the Biblical text in a fresh and exciting way. As I often say to the youth: "Keep the Bible weird!" For it is only when the Bible is read through fresh eyes that its unique beauty and truth can be discovered. Additionally, I am very interested in putting the Biblical justice tradition into practice. In religious contexts, this will often take the form of missions and outreach work. I particularly enjoy construction mission work, such as that provided by *Habitat for Humanity* and *REACH*



Mission Trips. Additionally, in the secular context, you are likely to spot me working with a variety of local community organizations seeking justice and equity in Pittsburgh and beyond. My special interest is justice for the Palestinian people, an interest that was sparked in part by outreach work that I undertook in 2015 with *Christian Peacemaker Teams*. When I'm not working, I am generally reading or writing—in fact, I am currently working on two books: the first, *Christophilia*, is on the intersection of spirituality and sexuality, the second, *A Phenomenology of Hopeless Time*, is on contemporary hopelessness and the Christian notion of hope. But it's not all dry scholarship! I also enjoy board games, dancing, listening to an endless pile of podcasts, and getting outside to run or hike. I have a niece and nephew back in New Hampshire who I try to visit and spoil as much as possible, and a Blue Heeler named Loki whose uncontrollable energy is somehow both adorable and exasperating. I look forward to getting to know you all even better over the next few months. And please, do not hesitate to reach out to me!

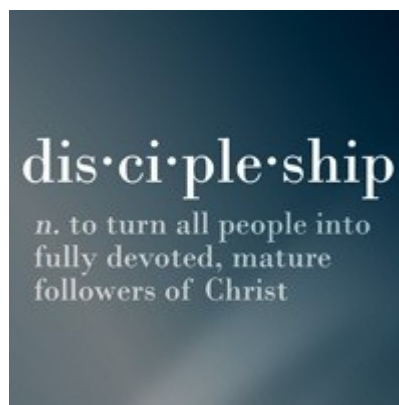

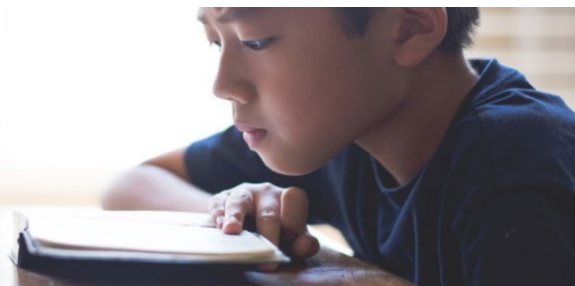

Requirements: The only qualification is your desire to bring joy and make a difference in a senior church member's life.

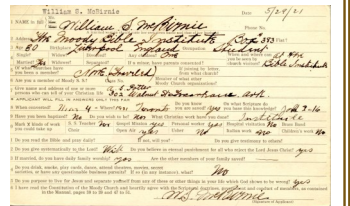

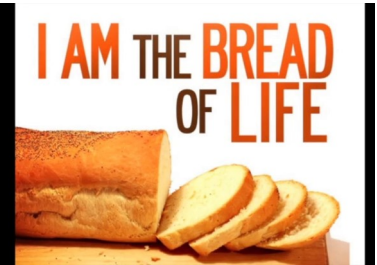
We continue to join with volunteers from other pantries to set-up and clean-up, register those receiving produce, distribute food, and help take food to cars. (We can always use more volunteers.)

BREAD FOR THE WORLD LOBBY DAY--June 11, 2019

Bread for the World Lobby Day began with an ecumenical morning worship service at St. Mark's Episcopal Church, which is only a short walk to Capitol Hill. This year over 300 Bread for the World members, representing almost every Christian denomination, came from 30 states, Washington DC, and Puerto Rico, to meet with their Congressional members. While the purpose of my trip was to deliver your letters, I always feel so blessed and inspired to participate in morning worship.

By noon all 300 Bread for the World members were making their way to Capitol Hill to begin our prearranged office visits. Usually each office gives us at least 30 minutes to discuss our concerns. There were eight Bread for the World members from Pennsylvania, and we met with staff members in Senator Casey's office and Senator Toomey's office. We asked both Senators to co-sponsor and pass the bipartisan Global Nutrition Resolution, which urges the U.S. Agency for International Development to fully implement the Multi-Sectoral Nutrition strategy to improve global nutrition. Your letters were delivered at this time. Joyce Rothermel, co-chair of SWPA Bread for the World team and I were the only delegates from Western PA and we are both in Mike Doyle's District. We were fortunate to meet with Representative Doyle himself. Since I had Baldwin Community UMC letters to Representative Conor Lamb and Representative Guy Reschenthaler, Joyce and I delivered these letters to the proper office and left them with the receptionist.



Lobby Day ended with an Advocacy Summit reception and closing worship in the Rayburn House Office Building.

A Message from the Men's Ministry - Where to find hope in times such as these?

We have become numb to the news flash of tragic events. When they occur, people argue over political stances, but avoid discussing causes and let time pass taking no effective action. Most of us look away, quickly moving back to our insulated rooms, and discount the risks that such an event would involve any of our own people directly. This acceptance of fate or bad luck leaves us no path to hope and unprepared to resist the forces making us numb. It seems hopeless. But instead of allowing this isolation and distraction to retain hold of us, we can resist by seeking hope and joy.

Let's first consider this question. What is important enough that you need to know, live, and hold on to so very tightly that it must at all costs be passed down from generation to generation? The Apostle Paul may have considered this same question as he sat in a Roman prison and wrote his last letter to the community of believers in the Greek city of Ephesus. He urged us to be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power. Paul had been a Jewish leader and was a persecutor of early Christians, but he was converted after meeting the resurrected Jesus Christ while he walked on the road to Damascus. He devoted the rest of his life to serving the Lord and spreading the Gospel's good news. Paul's letter to the Ephesians gave them what they needed to know, remember, and pass down from generation to generation to prepare them to deal with the world around them. He told them how they should build their strength in the Word of God, so they could resist the distractions of evil and have a path of hope. Paul's letter is just as important and relevant to us today as it was for the early Christian believers in Ephesus. Read about "putting on the full armor of God" in Ephesians 6, and also then, make time regularly to find your strength by reading the Gospel.

What else can we do? Refocus to what is important in this life and the next, stand then with the support of God, and resist the forces causing us to become numb. Let's reclaim Sunday mornings for church. Tell the coaches to reschedule the practices and games. Urge our family members and friends to get moving and also attend church with us. Be prepared to regain feeling and experience real joy. And pass the Gospel message on to those still numb. It may seem hard at first, but the rewards now and in the future are awesome.

Notice of intent to accept bids for cemetery lots:

Baldwin Church has owned cemetery lots located at Jefferson Memorial Cemetery for decades. The Trustees have agreed that sale of these lots is in the best interest of the church. We are going to request bids on the lots as groups or individually by church members and other persons interested in purchasing these cemetery lots.

As the intent of the sale of the cemetery lots is an effort to improve the church's financial position, we anticipate accepting the highest dollar bids for the lots whether the bids are for individual lots or multiple lots as a group. We reserve the right to reject any or all bids.

The lots available for sale are all in areas that were developed many years ago. There is little or no availability through Jefferson at this time, and are all nice sections.

Per Jefferson, the amounts below represent current values of the lots:

Sec 43 Sermon on the Mount--Today's cost for all 4 spaces is \$7,380.

Sec 38 Gospel--Today's cost for all 4 spaces is \$5,720.

Sec 14 Devotion--Today's cost for all 4 spaces is \$7,260.

Transfer procedures are as follows and should be verified with Mr. Mike Walker of Jefferson Memorial Cemetery, 412-655-4500, before the sale is completed:

As explained to us, the following is the basis for transfer of lots:

\$100 for each deed transferred, \$200 to split the deed (2 lots to one family, 2 to another)
15% of the lot sale must be placed in a lot maintenance fund, with a minimum of \$70.00 each lot.
