

SOUL RESTORATION AND

Nearly two thousand attendees gathered in Grove City in early June for four days of worship, business, and fellowship.

This year's Western Pennsylvania Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church featured a series of thought-provoking speakers in addition to conducting church business. Nancy Beach offered a seminar on the development and fostering of healthy teams; Rev. Dr. Shively Smith delivered a series of Bible study sermons on Ephesians; and Rev. Junius Dotson from Discipleship Ministries discussed intentional discipleship with the laity. Bishop Cynthia Moore-Koikoi delivered a powerful State of the Church address. The State of the Church, she says, is strong, and we are dressed in hope for a bright future. She encouraged us to be aware of the lack of support on Conference-level agencies, and stated that the numbers on our efforts to dismantle racism within the church are discouraging. However, through all the issues, there is hope for healthier, growing communities, and greater inclusion of people of color.

Roots of Faith, a ministry based out of Faith UMC in Fox Chapel, decorated the campus with brightly-painted rocks, for the attendees to collect and bring home to share with their communities.

His wife, Jenn, will remain in her position as Youth Coordinator here at Baldwin.


HERE I AM, LORD AND WELCOME TO PASTOR

"DISCIPLESHIP IS NOT A CLASS YOU GRADUATE FROM," DOTSON REMINDS LAITY

"Sawubona" is a Zulu greeting that translates to "I see you." How are we going forth to see all the people God has called us to serve?

Rev. Dotson started off this session by proudly showing attendees a photo of his son, who just graduated from college and began a career as a sports journalist.

"I don't like baseball," he said, "but my son taught me that if you don't touch first base, nothing you do after that matters."

For the church, first base is equipping and empowering our own disciples, and providing opportunities for them to grow in their faith. If we fail to take care of our own people and enable them, we miss everything else that comes after that.

"We've got to stop trying to fix churches and focus on making disciples. If you build disciples, you will build the church."

So what does that mean? It means our commitment to growing as disciples is vital to our service in the church. Our call to "See all the people" is not about fixing churches, it's about developing relationships. Dotson encouraged us to consider three questions:

(1) How have you grown in your faith this year?

(2) What spiritual discipline/practice has been most helpful?(3) What is your plan for spiritual growth this upcoming year?


These questions, he says, will help us move forward as disciples and will enable us to reach out to the communities around us.









