
This past weekend, Dr. Justin Pearl hosted "The Biblical Roots of Social Justice" in person and online via Zoom.

Spring has sprung in the preschool!! The children are so happy to be able to play outside again on the bikes and in God's Garden. We are taking nature walks up the park path to learn about the changing season and are excited to spot a bird, squirrel or deer. The students are also planting flowers, observing bean seeds sprouting and hatching butterflies from their cocoons. These days of sunshine and warmer temperatures bring smiles and happiness to everyone.

I can't believe that we only have a few more weeks left in this school year. It has been quite an interesting year, especially with starting in September in the midst of the Covid uncertainties. Our enrollment was less than expected, but we were happy to still be able to open with 128 students. I am grateful for how well the students, staff and parents followed our Covid guidelines with the common goal of keeping everyone healthy. These

little ones wore their masks daily without complaint and washed their hands like mini-surgeons. The teachers cleaned and disinfected regularly and made many changes in their classrooms to allow for social distancing. We are happy to report that we did not have to ever close the entire school due to virus transmission.

We are excited to bring back our summer camp program this year. The teachers have a lot of great things planned with our themes of The Circus, Bug's Life and Beach Party! We have Weird Eric coming to perform magic for the kids and there may be a visit from an ice cream truck!

In February, we began enrollment for the 2021-22 school year and were pleasantly surprised with the immediate and overwhelming responses. We currently have 205 students enrolled and have needed to add an extra 4-year-old classroom. Many thanks to the Pastors and Church Council for partnering with me to find additional space to accommodate all of the new families that want their child to attend next year. Baldwin Community Preschool has thrived for so many years and has such a positive reputation within the community that most of our students come to us through word of mouth recommendations.

I have so much to be thankful for during this Covid year of preschool— thankful for the parents who stuck with us and entrusted us with their children, thankful for teachers and my assistant Nicole for willingly coming to school and working diligently to make this year a safe and positive experience for our students, thankful for the pastors, church staff and congregation for their continued support of this important program. Mostly, I am thankful for our students. Their resilience, eagerness to learn and make new friends and their laughter and smiles are what this preschool is all about. Our students are true gifts from God and His light shines through them every day!





FINANCIAL NEWS:

- **Budget Update:** The Church Council has approved a \$490,730 balanced budget for 2021. This includes trimmed expenses in many areas balanced with intentional investment in evangelism and discipleship. While the budget anticipates lower giving, we are grateful for a forgivable PPP loan from the federal government that helps during this lean pandemic time, and we are hopeful that increased giving will accompany in-person worship and activities. We are deeply grateful for those who continue to give financially to the church. Thank you for your faithfulness and generosity! Your gifts make vibrant, life-giving ministries possible!
- **Giving Update:** Thank you to all who have continued to make financial gifts to the church in this difficult pandemic season. While January giving (\$10,602) was significantly down, February giving (\$27,531) and March giving (\$31,890) were back on track. Your generosity and faithfulness are greatly appreciated! Through your gifts, vibrant ministry with our congregation and community, both online and in person, will continue. We are on track with making monthly contributions toward our apportionments. 
